Singing Gratitude

Music is breath. It is heartbeat. It is the voice that rises from within, unfiltered, raw, and real. Sometimes joyful. Sometimes aching. Always true.

The Xhosa melody Ndisondela Kuwe walks with me. It is more than a song—it is a doorway, an invitation into sacred spaces. The words mean I draw near to You. A hymn, yes, but more than that. A Prayer. A surrender. A call not to seek answers, but to seek God. To move toward the divine, not from a place of strength, but from exhaustion, from the longing that lives in every human soul.

When this song is sung, something happens. The air changes. A quiet wind moves through the room. Voices tremble, crack, and finally break open. Long-held burdens slip through the cracks. In that moment vulnerable, stripped bare—the Holy Spirit meets us. Guides us. Pulls us closer to God, and closer to one another.

This is stewardship. To step forward with what we have, trusting that it is enough. Gratitude gives us the courage to give without fear, to pour ourselves out while still holding onto the song that makes us who we are. We do not shrink when we give. We do not lose ourselves. We grow.

Gratitude makes it possible to sing. To share. To let go.

And when we sing together, each voice rising with its own story, we find something greater than ourselves. Uxolo!

I wonder, how does gratitude help you to dare to share your song? Yebo!





Tell Out My SoulBy Phil McDonald

Some of you may remember in the 50's and 60's when Zion's nave was full every Sunday waiting to hear the message from the future Bishop Alan Bartlett. John Merchant led a full staff of



acolytes to perform their duties, and we were numerous and anxious group. Multiple services were enjoyed, including a family service in the Parish Hall prior to Sunday School. Friday evenings were a delight to experience with Turner Ramey and Donald Smith leading the "Brotherhood" of St. Andrew. Our visits from Bishop Campbell were always a joy and inspiration, as were our gatherings at Camp Peterkin in its early years. Sadie Hawkins Day is a personal camp event I won't expound upon. These are but a few examples of the experiences that forged my relationship with Zion. Most of these events still occur to this day.

The theme of this year's stewardship program for the national church is "Tell out my soul" from Luke 1:46. When Mary met Elizabeth, after the Immaculate Conception, and John first moved in her womb it caused Elizabeth to honor Mary as "Blessed art Thou among women." Mary's response was "My soul doth magnify the Lord" (KJV), more recently translated to "Tell out my soul," forming the introduction to the Magnificat.

Stewardship entails applying our time, talent and treasure toward the support and enhancement of both the physical and spiritual edifice of Zion. The buildings, programs, events, even our staff require our support to maintain the form and function of our goal of a community spiritual center. Stewardship is the fuel for this engine, or fire, if you will. It determines the outcome of all of our good intentions and dreams. Pledges are the manifestation of the "Treasure" portion of stewardship; certainly, no more important than Time or Talent, but without the treasure portion, we soon run out of fuel. If this is new to you, or unclear, a Pledge to Zion is a commitment to donate a specific amount of money on a repeating interval, be it weekly, monthly or yearly. The

goal of the Stewardship drive is to register pledges for the coming year to fund our budget, similar to United Way, Rotary and other community supported organizations.

Please consider including Zion in your regular giving plan. Whether it be through regular pledging, electronic pledging through Tithley, non-pledged donations, occasional gifts or estate endowments, Zion welcomes your treasure and strives to put these gifts to the best use for the community.
